
West Highlands

Western Highlands accessible from, and south of, Glenfinnan (Road to the Isles) and Glen Spean (includes Creag Meagaidh). This area includes Ben Nevis and the mountains around Glencoe. In the east, from Ben Alder south to Loch Lomond and Trossachs NP. Also Arran and Mull.

General Summary for Friday, 26 January, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 26 January, 2024

Highlands: Upland gales getting stronger through the day. Snow and hail on and off all day along the west coast but mostly dry in the east. England, Wales & Southern Uplands: Upland gales tending to ease and becoming dry with only very isolated showers. Many summits cloud free and bursts of sunshine. Remaining cool.

Upland gales getting stronger

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 26 January, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 45 to 50mph in the morning, although slightly lower on Arran. Gradually backing to southwesterly 50 to 55mph in the afternoon, risk higher.	
Effect of wind on you?	Walking increasingly difficult on higher areas; at times gusts could blow you over, particularly near precipitation. Significant wind chill.	
How wet?	Snow and hail	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional snow and hail on and off all day. Rain only in and just above valleys.	
Cloud on the hills?	Rarely clearing higher tops	
Chance of cloud	Varying cloud base: patches below 450 to 600m near precipitation (generally highest easternmost hills). Otherwise, base typically 800 to 1000m, again generally highest well inland, where highest tops may briefly clear. 20%

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sunshine, most widely lower easternmost slopes. Hazy, and abruptly very poor visibility in snow.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C. Will feel as cold as -20C directly in the wind. Warming into evening night.	
Freezing Level	750m. Lifting above summits overnight.

How windy? (On the Munros)	Lochaber: Southwesterly 50 to 60mph Lomond and Arran: Southwesterly 40mph. May ease a little everywhere in afternoon.	Southwesterly 60 to 80mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Lochaber: Difficult walking conditions; you may be blown over in Lochaber. Loch Lomond: Foot placements and balance challenging. Severe wind chill.	Walking very challenging. Very powerful gusts will occasionally reach lower sheltered slopes. Severe wind chill.
How wet?	Rain/snow showers, heavy in afternoon	Rain moving in
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and snow showers on and off through the day, particularly near coastal mountains. Becoming heavier and more widespread in the afternoon. Loch Lomond NP and Arran may have occasional drizzle.	Risk of pockets drizzle near coast in the morning will reduce through the day. Rain probably setting in from the afternoon or evening, initially Lochaber.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive	Extensive
	Cloud down to lowest slopes near coast and southern Loch Lomond NP. Cloud base will be mid-slopes or higher well inland.	Extensive cloud mid-slopes may clear toward higher summits intermittently in Lochaber. Persistently very low cloud near the coast.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sunshine. Hazy, particularly near the coast.	Little or no sun except, perhaps, on higher summits. Very hazy.
How Cold? (at 900m)	Around 0C. Feeling around -15C in the wind.	4C, feeling below -10C in the wind.
Freezing Level	800 to 1000m, coldest Lochaber.	Above summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 27 January, 2024

Total rainfall will be very small in Wales, the Peak District and the southern Pennines over the weekend and beyond. High winds over the weekend will temporarily ease for a day to two early next week. Periods of freezing temperatures will be brief on higher summits away from the Highlands, whilst across the Scottish Highlands, there will be a series of freeze-thaw cycles. Fronts continue to move across the Highlands, particularly the north west.

Forecast issued at 16:20 on Thursday, 25 January, 2024
