
West Highlands

Western Highlands accessible from, and south of, Glenfinnan (Road to the Isles) and Glen Spean (includes Creag Meagaidh). This area includes Ben Nevis and the mountains around Glencoe. In the east, from Ben Alder south to Loch Lomond and Trossachs NP. Also Arran and Mull.

General Summary for Monday, 27 May, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 27 May, 2024

Low pressure to northwest, brings an unstable southwesterly with clusters of rain or showers in the west, heaviest on the coast, transferring northeastwards through the day. This will allow an afternoon improvement in the west, whilst a focus of heavy downpours and thunderstorms will affect the east and northeast.

Headline for West Highlands

Clusters of rain or showers moving northeast. Improving in the afternoon.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 27 May, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Variable, 10 to 15mph, in the afternoon changing to westerly and strengthening with gusts up to 35mph.		
Effect of wind on you?	Small at start, starting to affect balance in the afternoon.		
How wet?	Mostly wet start, improving afternoon.		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Persistent, light to moderate rain in the morning, most intense on the coast. Local showery bursts well inland into early afternoon, but slowly improving conditions from the south.		
Cloud on the hills?	Hills covered extensively, lifting into afternoon with breaks.		
	Hills extensively covered at start, lifting slightly during the day, clearing lower slopes but leaving higher tops in clouds, but some breaks forming, especially during the afternoon.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%, lifting to 50% in the afternoon.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Hardly any break in clouds inland, some sunshine in the afternoon in the south and on the west coastal areas. Poor visibility morning, improving.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 to 6C. As wind strengthens will feel below freezing on higher terrain.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

West Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros)	Low confidence: South to southeasterly 10 to 20mph, but risk near 30mph west coast and sudden gusts near showers.	Fairly light and variable for several hours, before tending to become northwesterly 10 to perhaps 15mph later.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery conditions up the west coast for a time, and some sudden gusty conditions near showers. Otherwise, mostly small.	Mostly negligible, but scope for sudden gusts into afternoon in and around heavy showers.
How wet?	Risk of heavy showers forming	Clusters of heavy showers, risk thunder.
(Precipitation and its impact)	From dawn, mostly dry, but risk of bursts of rain here and there edging up from south. Toward and into afternoon, potential for heavy showers to form, risk thunder.	From dawn, areas of rain with some heavy bursts, mainly near coast and in south. Through day, clusters of heavy showers will break out, risk isolated thunderstorms, coastal hills drier.
Cloud on the hills?	May be extensive for a time, some breaks.	Cloud banks most extensive early, and in downpours.
	Cloud banks may be extensive for a time, especially in the south in the morning, before a gradual lift in bases. However, bases widely lowering again in showers.	Within a humid environment, expect widespread cloud banks at varying heights, some slopes or tops clear above or between cloud layers. Slow rise in bases, away from heavy downpours.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mid to high level cloud increasing from south, but scope for some patches of sun, before clouds tend to bubble up. Visibility mostly very good, poor in rain.	Often overcast, with limited patches of sun. May become sunnier coastal hills. Visibility good, but rather murky at times in morning, and poor visibility in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C	6C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 28 May, 2024

Tuesday will see unsettled conditions prevail with spells of rain moving in from the southwest courtesy of a warm front. Uncertainty on northward extent, but heavy showers may develop over the Highlands. Wednesday will see frequent areas of heavy showers or local thunderstorms, western coastal hills best. Then scope for drier conditions to develop as a ridge of high pressure moves in from the west, bringing a north to northwest flow. Low cloud and drizzly showers likely NW Scotland.
