
West Highlands

Western Highlands accessible from, and south of, Glenfinnan (Road to the Isles) and Glen Spean (includes Creag Meagaidh). This area includes Ben Nevis and the mountains around Glencoe. In the east, from Ben Alder south to Loch Lomond and Trossachs NP. Also Arran and Mull.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 16 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 16 April, 2025

Patchy morning rain in Scotland becomes widespread with heavy moments, falling as snow across the Munros. Patchy rain with heavy bursts in north England, strong winds here too with risk of gales. Gales force winds for a time in the Peak District and Wales. Frequent showery rain here with risk of flooding around the Brecon Beacons.

Headline for West Highlands

Morning rain south spreads north. Cloud filling in and breezy.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 17 April, 2025

A complex weather situation ahead as areas of low pressure circulate slowly near the British Isles. A mix of showers with hail and snow on hills, at times more persistent and widespread rain and hill snow, most notably in western areas on Friday in the near term. Easter looks to be a showery day with some larger bands of rain around southern England and Wales. Occasional windows of dry and clear conditions locally. Winds will gradually turn southeasterly-to-easterly next week and becoming quite strong with risk of gales for most. Temperatures staying on the cool side, risk feeling very cold in wind chill.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Tuesday, 15 April, 2025
