

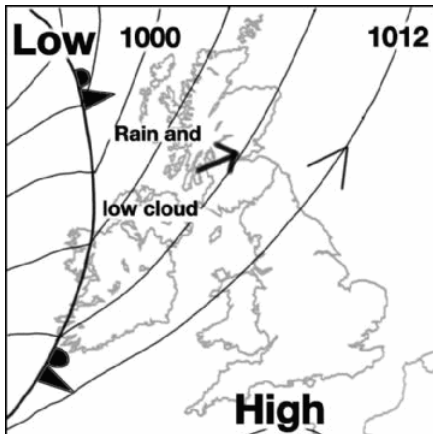
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

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## General Summary for Friday, 2 August, 2024



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 2 August, 2024

Rain and will advance gradually across Scotland from the middle of the day onwards, and in evening reach mountains close to the Irish Sea. There will also be areas of low cloud. Nevertheless, for many areas, including east Scotland extensively dry and warm. Upland wind approaching gale force western Scotland.

#### Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Becoming blustery. Chance of a little rain late on.

## Detailed Forecast for Friday, 2 August, 2024

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southerly, starting 10 to 15mph, but gradually strengthening to 25mph by early afternoon; locally 35mph by evening.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Walking becoming arduous on higher area, and sudden gusts may unbalance you - including on lower slopes.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain unlikely</b> The odd burst of rain almost anywhere later in day.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Little if any</b>
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Almost certain</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sunshine. Visibility very good, but a haze.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	15C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	20 to 23C in the afternoon.

	<b>Saturday 3 August</b>	<b>Sunday 4 August</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Westerly 15 to perhaps 20mph on highest tops.	Southerly, starting 15mph, strengthening to 30mph, 40-45mph in gusts possible.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Small.</b>	<b>Small at start, deteriorating, becoming blustery, walking strenuous and stability affected.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain very unlikely</b> Isolated showers.	<b>Most of the day dry, chance rain later</b> Extensively dry, but toward the evening risk rain moving in from the west.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>All clearing</b>  Might briefly cover some fells at first in the morning. Most of the day fells clear.	<b>Hills extensively cloud-free</b>  Some tops may for a while be in cloud, but most of the time cloud-free everywhere.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Greater than 90%</b>	<b>90%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud soon breaking to give periods of sun: sunniest afternoon, initially near the coast. Visibility very good although some haze.	Sunny spells in the morning, deteriorating from the west, in the afternoon sunshine only eastern slopes. Excellent visibility by afternoon.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	9 to 13C	10C to 14C
<b>And in the valleys</b>	Reaching 18 to 20C in the afternoon.	10C at dawn rising to 18 to 21C

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 3 August, 2024**

Low pressure centres, mostly passing northwest of Scotland), and their associated fronts, will intermittently windy and wet conditions next week. Most rainfall will be on western mountains, with considerable rainfall on the W & NW highlands of Scotland. Frequently windy across Scotland. Lowest rainfall will be in eastern Scotland, the southern Pennines and easternmost Wales. Temperature wise warm and very humid on Monday, but through the week generally colder than this week.
