

General Summary for Saturday, 14 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2025

Varied across Britain through the day, particularly England and Wales, where some sunshine will be interspersed with rain (including thunderstorms), low cloud and changes in wind speed and direction. Changes slower in Scotland where broadly a band of thundery rain will move northwards.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Very varied: Thunderstorms, low cloud and strong wind. Sometimes fine.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 14 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly, erratically veering through day to southwesterly. Up to 35mph at dawn and again from south afternoon, but perhaps below 20mph for a few hours.		
Effect of wind on you?	Sometimes fairly small, but particularly morning gusts winds (including on lower slopes) will make balance difficult for periods.		
How wet?	Thunderstorms mainly morning but rain from time to time all day		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Morning: Widespread thunderstorms giving locally torrential rain and flash flooding from dawn will ease to patchy rain within a few hours. Afternoon: Intermittently fine, but also patches of rain and drizzle (mainly more western		
areas), including the risk of a further thunderstorm. Cloud on the hills? Very extensive dawn; gradually clearing			
Cloud on the mis?	Frequent or persistent fog higher slopes, sometimes below 600m, but in western dales in Yorkshire, periods when cloud base near or below 300m. A few breaks in the cloud, may allow fells to clear later in day.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy or dull and misty most of day, although patches of sun at times. Visibility mostly excellent.		
How Cold? (at 700m)	12C		
And in the valleys	Rising to between 16 and perhaps 19C afternoon, warmest eastern dales.

	Sunday 15 June	Monday 16 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, 25mph.	Between southwest and west; 25mph - perhaps 35mph at times higher summits.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small	Expect walking to be increasingly Impeded with height: perhaps arduous on higher tops. Considerable wind chill.
How wet?	Risk drizzly showers Yorkshire	Rain unlikely
(Precipitation and its impact)	Risk occasional drizzly rain, generally confined to western dales in Yorkshire. Total rainfall small. Elsewhere, drizzly showers, if any, rare.	
Cloud on the hills?	Unlikely to clear higher tops all day; lowest cloud base Yorkshire	Extensive western Yorkshire dales; clearing most other summits.
	Western dales Yorkshire: cloud base sometimes 300m nearest Irish Sea coast and rarely above 500 or 600m otherwise. Elsewhere: cloud base highest afternoon when mostly above 650 to 800m - may clear highest N Pennines.	Western dales in Yorkshire: Higher tops may be foggy all day, the cloud base typically 450m late morning, perhaps not lifting above 600m all day. Elsewhere: cloud base above the summits by midday.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	80% by afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sun - least sun western dales in Yorkshire. Frequently very good or excellent visibility.	Patchwork of sunshine and very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	10C	11C. Will feel only just above freezing point directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Ranging from 14 to 17C in the afternoon, coldest western Yorkshire dales.	17 to 20C in afternoon, coldest western dales in Yorkshire

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 15 June, 2025

Colder air from the west will reach all areas by Sunday. However, low cloud still extensive on western mountains, together with drizzly showers. Little rainfall most of next week and increasingly warm, although western Scotland colder with occasional rain as weakening fronts affect particularly the NW Highlands. By mid week it should be fine everywhere - although it may not last into the following weekend.
