

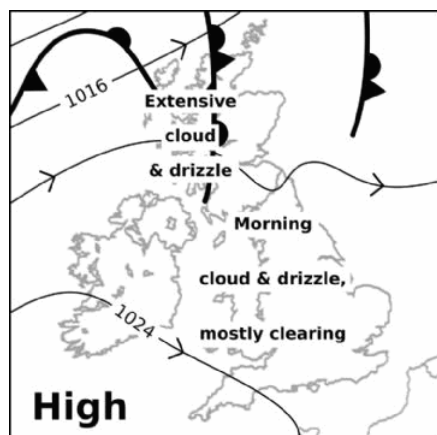
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 July, 2025

Extensive cloud and drizzle near the all western coasts; improving in the afternoon when only a few patches remain, most extensive on the Cuillin where it will also be windy. Cloud base higher well inland with occasional breaks; clearing Peak District and parts of Wales. Feeling cool in Scotland and mild in England and Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Morning drizzle fading; clouds tending to break

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 20mph, up to 25mph for a time in morning higher North Pennines.
Effect of wind on you?	Overall fairly small but occasional gusts in the eastern Pennines may affect your balance at times.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some drizzly rain in morning Patchy drizzle or local light rain in the morning, mainly northern and western fells. Fading to become generally dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, some improvement Covering fells fairly widely above 500-600m in the morning, or lower for a time on the western fells. Base rising and breaks forming toward higher slopes in the east, but lingering over western tops until the evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little sun breaking through mainly toward east. Visibility becoming good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 700m)	11C rising to 15C afternoon, humid. Feeling a touch cooler in the wind.
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 21C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West to southwesterly 10 to 15ph, to gusty 20mph around some tops, mainly North Pennines. Mostly small. Comfort of walking may be affecting during gusts.	Southerly 10mph or less; often variable direction. Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	Very likely dry Remote risk of isolated late-afternoon thundery showers. Dry otherwise.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Low cloud largely breaking up Covering many fells early morning, to lower elevations for a time western Yorks Dales NP. Cloud base soon rising and breaks forming during morning, most or all fells clear afternoon. 30% rising to 80%	Little or no cloud Very small chance of patchy cloud on higher ground should there be afternoon showers. 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy morning, misty in places. Sun breaking through more with time. Visibility increasingly very good.	Widespread sunshine through thin high-level cloud; beware sunburn and dehydration. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	13C rising to 17C. 13C at dawn, rising to 23C in the afternoon.	21C in the afternoon. 13C at dawn, soon nearer 20C in the morning. Rising to 21 to 26C by mid-afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 10 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
