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# General Summary for Sunday, 13 July, 2025



## British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 13 July, 2025

Very warm across the mountains from overnight, soon feeling hot in morning sun. Some valleys again approaching 30C by early afternoon, though mostly slightly less hot than Saturday. A veil of high cloud tending to weaken the sun. Local gusty E-SE'ly winds. Generally dry, later a chance of very isolated showers.

## Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Very warm, sun and increasing high cloud, gusty in places.

# Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 13 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly turning easterly 15-20mph. Some stronger gusts down western slopes early, notably southern/Three Peaks area.		
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, some occasional gusty spots may feel noticeable.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected most or all day Chance local spots of rain from high cloud later in the day.		
Cloud on the hills?	<b>Fells clear</b> Possible mist on lower easternmost Pennines at dawn soon clearing. Low cloud may return from east and thicken into nighttime.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunny at dawn, then patchy high cloud building, increasingly shrouding sun. Excellent visibility.		
How Cold? (at 700m)	16C rising to 19C. Easternmost fells of N Pennines may stay a degree cooler; dropping slightly into evening.		
And in the valleys	11 to 13C at dawn - coolest temperatures in eastern N Pennines. Rising to 27C west, slightly cooler easternmost areas.

Blustery, starting to affect comfortable walking on higher terrain.
How wet?	Thunderstorms likely	Rain on and off; heavy, risk thunder
(Precipitation and its impact)	Risk heavy and possibly thundery bursts of rain soon in the morning, likely setting in to give widespread heavy rain, torrential bursts and thunderstorms. May break up afternoon, but further thundery showers.	Risk of fairly persistent rain, some heavy showery bursts mixed in, drifting eastwards. Possible thundery downpours during afternoon, moving toward northeast by evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive low cloud, may lift later	Fairly extensive, may improve a little
	Varied low cloud from dawn, to mid or lower elevations, particularly in east. Filling in widely in rain, cloud banks to lower slopes. Later may lift and break.	Cloud banks most extensive to some lower elevations in morning, tending to become confined to upper slopes, but varied in rain; some higher breaks possible later afternoon-evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% rising to 50% later	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. Hazy, very murky in rain; may improve later in day.	Largely cloudy, some sun breaking through afternoon-evening. Misty or murky in rain, visibility may improve with time, better later in day west.
How Cold? (at 700m)	10C where in cloud, up to 13C for a time. Tending to lower slightly later.	Around 10C, or slightly cooler early in day.
And in the valleys	15C at dawn, rising to 22C away from rain into afternoon; humid, but becoming fresher later.	12C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.

## Planning Outlook

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 14 July, 2025

Lowering pressure from southwest late Sunday into Monday bringing increasing risk bursts of rain and thunderstorms to start the new week, strong and gusty southerly winds. Temperatures will cool towards average. Heavy rain likely moving across England and Wales on Tuesday accompanied by near-gale southwesterlies, lighter winds Scotland. Low pressure is likely to be common in the extended outlook with slow-moving areas of showery rain, some thundery bursts locally, interspersed with drier days. Temperatures often on the warm side, some humid days.
