



General Summary for Thursday, 14 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 14 August, 2025

Continued very humid weather, and a change toward less warmth, will lead to vary varied conditions - difficult to give detail - across the hills. Areas of rain, in places thundery, and low cloud will be most extensive morning; but an overall improvement will be slow and patchy.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Patches of rain and low cloud: overall will tend to improve.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 14 August, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwest to westerly 10 to perhaps later 15 or 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain occasionally - amounting to very little Pockets of drizzly rain morning (and possibly post dawn the odd heavy thundery burst). By afternoon, here and there the odd patch of rain still left but extensively dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fog gradually clearing; though slowly particularly more western slopes Confidence low: Fog covering hills at various heights most or all day western fells south of Tebay, but may clear Bowland Forest, The cloud may break up afternoon. Elsewhere, areas of very low cloud morning, but summits below 650m very likely clearing by early to mid afternoon. 20%, through day rising (slowly Yorkshire) to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sunshine slowly coming through, mainly from afternoon. Haze gradually thinning to give excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	16C.
And in the valleys	21 to 24C in afternoon, warmest more eastern dales. Very humid.

How windy? (On the summits)	East or northeasterly, 10 to perhaps 15mph.	Easterly 10 to perhaps 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly negligible	Mostly negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Rain very unlikely Small risk pockets drizzle until mid, possibly late morning more eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any by afternoon Low confidence morning; ribbons of fog some or many valleys and lower slopes - most or perhaps all higher areas could be above the fog. By late morning, the fog clearing.	Most or all summits cloud free by afternoon After dawn, ribbons of fog some valleys and lower slopes, whilst here and there fog higher areas, but the fells may well be above the cloud. The fog will very likely have cleared by late morning or midday.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90% from midday	60% rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine increasingly breaking through morning and middle of day. Fog clearing to excellent visibility.	Extensive bright sunshine and excellent or superb visibility as fog clears through the morning.
How Cold? (at 700m)	14C rising to 17C.	Around 12C after dawn; and 17C mid afternoon.
And in the valleys	Will rise to 21 to 24C in the afternoon.	20 to 22C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 15 August, 2025

High pressure, generally centred near northern Britain, will develop and persist well into next week, bringing low rainfall (although here and there thundery showers) and for most mountains extensive sunshine and light wind. Nevertheless, cloud will come and go, most widely across more eastern mountains. It will remain very warm.
