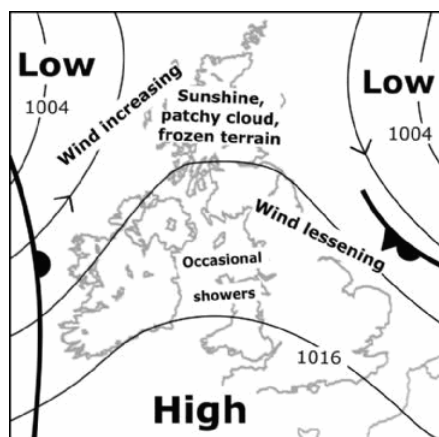

General Summary for Sunday, 30 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 November, 2025

A fine day for many places, sunshine and broken cloud. Much terrain frozen in the Highlands, where a lull in wind, later strengthening southerlies in west. Strong northwesterlies for England and Wales tend to drop. Some local showers move inland from the Irish Sea. Deteriorating all areas into night.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Chilly wind eases; increases into night. Mostly sunny.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 30 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 25 to 30mph at first, or stronger before dawn, easing gradually, turning westerly 15mph afternoon. Increasing into night southerly 40-50mph. Considerable wind chill and buffeting in exposure early in day, lessening into afternoon. Deteriorating into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Icy patches, a dusting of fresh snow on some tops. Chance of a brief shower coming in from west, mainly afternoon around Three Peaks.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Mostly clear Early cloud patches mostly northern areas tending to break up from most hills. Late in day, patches returning onto tops in Ingleborough area. 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	0 or -1C, small variation with height in the morning. Rising into night. Feeling near -10C if exposed to strongest wind at first. Near freezing from dawn, rising to max 3 or 4C early afternoon. Then rising during night up to 7C.

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 1 December, 2025

Areas of low pressure circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern in the week ahead, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday, with rain for most places at times, but prolonged heavier rain for England and Wales. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2025.
