

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## General Summary for Thursday, 18 December, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 18 December. 2025

Scotland: South to south-west gales bringing hill fog and showers, before band of heavy, perhaps squally, rain moves up from the southwest in afternoon, snow tops.

England and Wales: Heavy rain spreading north with hill fog becoming extensive with strong to gale force southerly winds.

#### **Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines**

Southerly gales with heavy rain moving up from the south.

# Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 18 December, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 30 to 50mph, but direction and speed likely to vary, possibly lower speeds for periods during day.  Expect arduous walking conditions and considerable wind chill on higher fells, but may lessen for periods.		
Effect of wind on you?			
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy rain likely setting in  An odd shower, but a few hours may be dry, for longest northern areas.  Then persistent heavy rain likely moving in from southwest during day. Breaking up into showery rain and hail evening into night.		
Cloud on the hills?	Varied, becoming extensive Patchy cloud banks, most persistent Yorks Dales NP, some breaks northward, but as rain sets in, widely lowering over hills.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% dropping below 10%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, possibly good visibility mainly in north for a time; high cloud thickens and lowers to be increasingly murky in rain.		
How Cold? (at 700m)	3 or 4C, then lowering to 1C into night. Wind chill feeling as cold as -10C on tops.		
And in the valleys	Little variation night into day, 7 or 8C; then dropping cooler later evening onward.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 45 to 60mph, tending to lessen a little during day.	South to south-easterly 20 to 30mph, perhaps exceeding 35mph for a time westernmost hills.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions over higher fells, frequent buffeting from modest elevations upward. Significant wind chill.	A very blustery and gusty airflow, arduous towards west coast especially, with considerable buffeting and wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers mostly west, hail	Patchy rain, mainly west.
	Scattered showers, most common western Yorks Dales in morning, with hail, possibly snow on highest tops in N Pennines. Tending to fade during afternoon.	Patchy rain, mainly across the western dales as a front edges in from the west. Little if any elsewhere.
Cloud on the hills?	Breaks to many tops	Fairly extensive in the west
	Patchy cloud grazing higher tops, most often western Yorks Dales in morning, lifting above most tops for periods.	Likely to cover the hills fairly extensively in the west. Occasional breaks. More broken cloud bases at times in the east where mainly just capping tops at times.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	30% west, 70% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun most frequent east/northeast, patchy sun western Dales. Visibility often very good, reduced in showers.	A little weak sun possible should cloud layers thin, mostly likely in the east. Visibility good or very good, but poor in any rain.
How Cold? (at 700m)	2 or 3C. Feeling like -12C directly in the wind.	3 or 4C
And in the valleys	4C from dawn, rising to 7C afternoon.	5 to 7C

### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 19 December, 2025

South-southwesterly winds widely remain gale force over the mountains later this week and through into Saturday, severe upland gales for periods. Showery on Friday, most frequent in western Scotland with hail, also snow over tops. Another belt of persistent rain likely arrives onto western hills into Saturday, snow only highest Scotlish tops. A switch to east-southeasterly winds by Sunday into early next week, some residual rain and high-level snow, but a drier theme develops and favouring chillier conditions into the Christmas period.
