

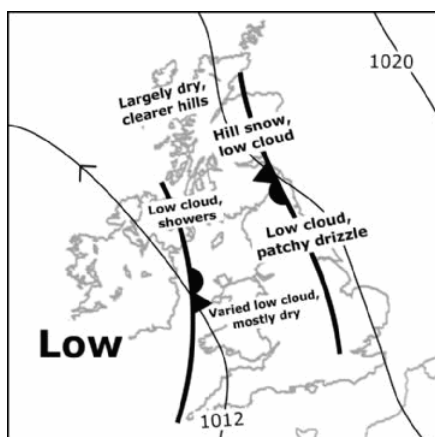
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Saturday, 17 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 17 January, 2026

A slow-moving area of snowfall in central-eastern Highlands, may be often patchy and light, but risk locally more persistent, low cloud extensive. Clearer northwest coasts of Scotland. Low cloud much of northern England, some early rain and hill snow. Drier for Wales with varied low cloud. Light-moderate SE'ly winds.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Early rain, snow tops; hill fog widely. Moderate breeze.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 17 January, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 15 to 25mph, strongest over higher North Pennines, gusty in places.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but a marked chill where exposed to the strongest breeze.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early rain and high level snow fades Rain or drizzle, plus sleet or light snow over higher terrain, fairly widely at first, locally persistent and steadier for a few hours early morning, clearing northward, then occasional rain, summit sleet.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive from lower slopes up Banks of low cloud widely from lower slopes up, with fog right down into some of the valleys in morning. Limited breaks, locally some between cloud layers, best toward north around Vale of Eden.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensively dull with mist and murk, concentrated over eastern Dales. Visibility best in the west, improving with time as early rain clears.
How Cold? (at 700m)	1 or 2C. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	1 to 3C at dawn, coldest northern valleys, lifting to 5C.

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 18 January, 2026

A slow-moving weather pattern onward into early next week with chilly air in place across the British Isles, mountains staying near to freezing point in Scotland, typically just above freezing to high tops in England and Wales for a few days. Some weak fronts try to push in from the west bringing occasional rain and hill snow, amounts generally small. High pressure around Scandinavia is likely to dominate the patterns into the later stages of January, with colder air trying to push in from the east, much mountain terrain will be frozen. Occasional snow likely, generally driest in the northwest.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
