

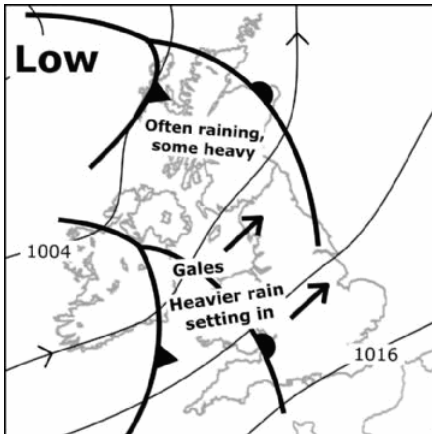
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Monday, 1 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 June, 2026

Rain affects all areas during the day, some heavy falls widely, most constant in Wales. Low cloud across the hills, blanketing to lower slopes in west coastal areas. South-southwest winds, varied in Scotland, but stronger England and particularly Wales, here gales over tops. Fairly mild air, but feeling cooler in wind.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Increasingly windy. Rain on and off, some heavier, cloud lowers.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 1 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 25mph in morning, tending to strengthen, reaching 35-40mph into afternoon, continuing into evening. May ease a little toward dusk.
Effect of wind on you?	Increasingly blustery, walking becoming strenuous over exposed high terrain with buffeting gusts. Considerable wind chill develops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain becomes frequent, heavier afternoon Patchy rain drifting from the southwest from dawn, a few dry windows mainly in eastern areas, but increasingly frequent rain by middle of day onward, most persistent in west, heavier at times. Rain continuing into evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Variable, then lowering extensively Patches at various heights on the west hill groups at dawn, only odd caps on eastern fells, but filling in more extensively through morning, lowering in rain, rarely above 600m into afternoon, lower banks in west south of Tebay.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40% dropping to 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly overcast, increasingly dull in west. Local very good visibility in east in morning, soon mostly poor in west, hazy at best, local improvements northeast if dry.
How Cold? (at 700m)	9 or 10C, rising to 11C. Feeling near freezing in strongest direct wind.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to 14 or 15C, quite humid.

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 2 June	Wednesday 3 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 20mph.	South-southwesterly 30 to 50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Widely strenuous walking in exposure, buffeting gusts on higher tops, balance challenging. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy thundery showers into afternoon Scattered showers, forming mostly into middle of day, increasingly heavy bursts passing eastwards over a few hours, risk of thunder, tending to clear eastward later.	Rain and drizzle persistent Rain extends in from the southwest, becoming fairly persistent, heaviest western Dales, drizzly even when heavier rain fades; occasionally easing off east and northeastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting often above tops Patchy cloud banks around some upper slopes in the morning, soon mostly above many tops, but ragged patches return around showers. Later largely clearing.	Fairly extensive Covering the hills widely, lowest bases in western areas south from Tebay, rarely above 500-600m. Some breaks higher up eastern hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, becoming sunnier in west later in day. Visibility very good, reduced in showers.	Glimpses of sun mostly eastern dales in morning, otherwise cloudy. Visibility good below cloud, but reduced in rain, poorer west.
How Cold? (at 700m)	9C up to 11C afternoon.	7 to 9C, slight rise afternoon mainly east. Wind chill feeling like -5C.
And in the valleys	11C at dawn, rising to max 17C afternoon.	10C at dawn, rising to max 16C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 2 June, 2026**

An unsettled spell through early June, possibly through the first two weeks, as low pressure over the north Atlantic and southwesterly winds dominate. Periods of rain mixed with showery days widely - the most constant rain over western mountains with low cloud often shrouding the hills. Wind speed will vary, but up to gale-force for periods over the hills, mostly in Scotland by later this week. Higher pressure to the south tends to expand across and just east of Britain later in the week, bringing some drier weather, but western hills even in England and Wales may remain often misty and drizzly. Temperatures near average, cooler at times. Mid June onward shows signs of drier and warmer weather.
