

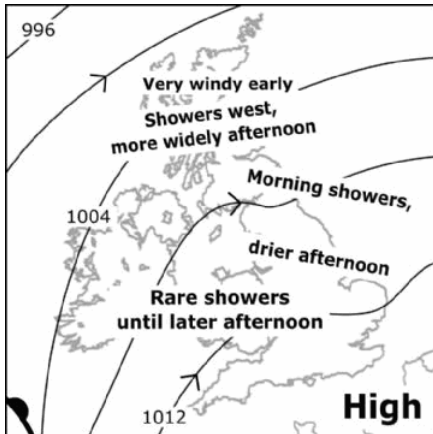
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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## General Summary for Friday, 5 June, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 5 June, 2026**

Blustery start, gale-force gusts in N England and Scotland; easing. Chilly with showers in W Scotland, showers more widely over the highlands afternoon with sunny interludes. Early showers in England and Wales ease by afternoon, only well-scattered showers remain over Wales and S Pennines, plenty sun breaks.

## Detailed Forecast for Friday, 5 June, 2026

<p><b>How windy? (On the summits)</b></p> <p><b>Effect of wind on you?</b></p>	<p>Westerly 30-35mph dawn, gusting 40mph or higher just at and before dawn. Soon easing and shifting southwesterly to 15-20mph afternoon, and lower speeds south a few hours later afternoon. Shifting southerly late in the day.</p> <p><b>Strenuous walking early, strongest wind challenging stability with significant wind chill. Soon easing, effects fairly small most of afternoon.</b></p>
<p><b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p><b>Morning showers, largely dry afternoon</b></p> <p>Showery rain drifting from the west in the morning, some risk of a drizzle over western Yorks Dales in the morning in cloud. Showers largely subside by afternoon, just a few well-scattered spots here and there.</p>
<p><b>Cloud on the hills?</b></p> <p><b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b></p>	<p><b>Likely clearing summits</b></p> <p>Fairly extensive above 400-500m west slopes just at dawn, some ragged lower patches; higher and more broken east. Lifting with breaks forming through morning, clearing this fells by midday, but odd banks may cling to tops for a bit longer.</p> <p><b>Rising to 90%</b></p>
<p><b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Patchwork of sunshine, perhaps more widely sunny later afternoon but some high cloud will begin to build.</p> <p>Very good visibility.</p>
<p><b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b></p> <p><b>And in the valleys</b></p>	<p>5C rising to 8 or 9C, only slight drop into night.</p> <p>Feeling like -5C in strongest early wind, this effect easing.</p> <p>7C at dawn, locally a degree cooler eastern dales. Rising to 15C.</p>

## Yorkshire Dales &amp; North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	<b>Saturday 6 June</b>	<b>Sunday 7 June</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	S-SE'ly, uncertain strongest wind, likely 40-45mph, but trending lighter through afternoon, towards 20-25mph. <b>Walking arduous, to challenging for several morning hours with wind chill, effects probably easing; some uncertainty.</b>	Southwesterly 25-35mph, gusty over tops particularly early. May deteriorate, greatest risk north, sustained speeds 35-40mph. <b>Ease of walking always impacted, increasingly strenuous over the tops with notable wind chill, strongest effects north.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Risk of rain developing</b> Patchy rain likely moving in from the southwest, but N Pennines may start largely dry for a few hours. Risk of rain becoming more persistent and heavier for a time, but timing and extent is uncertain.	<b>Some light rain</b> Patchy light rain drifting onto western fells from time to time, some risk of more frequent rain N Pennines later, but totals will be small, and many fells often dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>  <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Fairly extensive for periods</b>  Varied cloud banks mostly southwestern areas at first, but likely developing more widely, filling in and lowering to shroud most hills to mid-slopes in rain; some more broken periods with higher bases, timing and detail uncertain.  <b>30%</b>	<b>Caps may linger on northern tops</b>  May be fairly extensive from 500m up early hours, lowest bases from Tebay southward. Rising with time, likely clearing Yorks Dales NP summits, and maybe N Pennines too, but caps may just graze Cross Fell group at times.  <b>Rising to 70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun weak at best through high cloud early in day in east, becoming widely overcast. Visibility very good where dry, but reducing in rain, risk becoming poor in west.	Sunshine in the morning is soon weakened by high cloud, increasingly so through the day. Very good visibility.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>  <b>And in the valleys</b>	6C rising to 9C afternoon, though may rise slightly less; some uncertainty. Feeling near/below freezing in the wind. 9C at dawn, rising to 14 or 15C afternoon, though perhaps slightly less.	8 or 9C rising to 12C. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind.  7C at dawn, rising to 16C.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 6 June, 2026**

Unsettled over the weekend as southwesterly flow draws several areas of rain across the country, best of dry slopes to the northeast, and perhaps a drier Sunday for England and Wales through blustery, some uncertainty in detail. Generally unsettled next week too: showers affect most hills Monday and Tuesday, lowest cloud and most persistent rain along western slopes, but with some breaks as well with sunshine. Timing of most unsettled weather remains uncertain, but some risk of a deeper area of lower pressure from Wednesday or later bringing widespread strong winds, probably gales over many summits, with prolonged heavy rain. Temperatures probably trending milder again into the weekend, pressure may begin to rise in the south, but this uncertain as well.
