

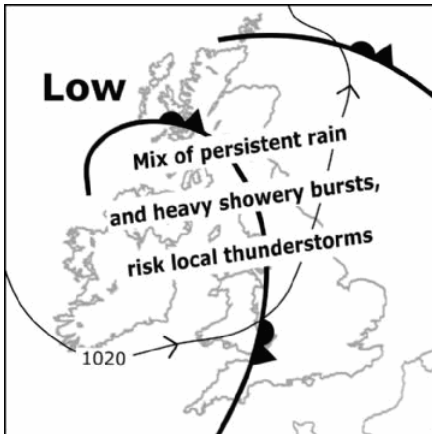
# Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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## General Summary for Tuesday, 30 June, 2026



**British Mountain Summary:**  
Based on forecast chart for noon 30 June, 2026

**Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines**  
Frequent rain, some heavy bursts. Moderate breeze.

## Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 30 June, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	South turning southwesterly 15 to 20mph, at times 25mph on higher tops, gusty around rain, tending to lessen later in day from west, shifting westerly; may increase a little in west up to dusk.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small, but feeling more blustery in morning and middle of day on higher tops.</b>
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Frequent or persistent rain, heavy bursts afternoon, risk lightning</b> Areas of rain and showers throughout the day, periods of constant rain, mostly western areas in morning, but increasingly widely some heavy bursts through afternoon, moving east into evening; risk of hail and thunder.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Most persistent western Dales</b> Cloud banks often capping western tops in Three Peaks area, but filling in more widely on tops in rain, ragged low patches. Breaks for periods northeast Pennines.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>40%</b>
<b>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</b>	Generally cloudy, a little weak sun mainly morning in east. Visibility often reduced by rain, poor for periods; intermittently very good if dry.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>	10C rising to 12C afternoon. Feeling like 3 to 6C in the breeze.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	11C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.

## Yorkshire Dales &amp; North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 1 July	Thursday 2 July
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>  <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Westerly 15-20mph in morning, increasing southwesterly, to 25-35mph later afternoon, by evening 50mph+.  <b>Fairly small in the morning, but becoming more blustery, walking uncomfortable then increasingly arduous later in exposure.</b>	Westerly, risk 60-70mph dawn-early morning, lessening to 30-40mph during morning, 20-30mph in afternoon.  <b>Risk severe conditions from overnight and still difficult well into daytime, walking and balance challenging, slowly improving.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain later in day</b> Generally dry much of the day, except for an odd isolated shower. Onward into evening, rain moving in from west, becoming persistent western areas later in day.	<b>Showers fade</b> Overnight rain likely clears to leave showery conditions in the morning, becoming well scattered and brief afternoon, may become more often dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Varied in morning, mostly lifting</b>  Cloud banks mostly higher and western fells in the morning, may cover some mid slopes for a time. Lifting higher and breaking from most tops, some patches may come and go near Ingleborough.	<b>Lifting and clearing most tops</b>  Covering high terrain fairly widely from dawn, soon mostly confined to highest tops and gradually tending to thin and break above most hills, some patches west.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>30% rising to 80% until late in day</b>	<b>30% rising to 80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, giving way to high cloud moving in from west later. Visibility excellent.	Occasional sun breaking through, most often eastern lower slopes. Visibility very good below cloud, some haze toward westernmost Yorks Dales.
<b>How Cold? (at 700m)</b>  <b>And in the valleys</b>	10 to 13C, coolest in west. Feeling nearer to freezing on high tops as wind increases later.  13C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.	8C rising to 12C afternoon. Directly in the stronger winds feeling like -5C on tops, nearer 0 to +3C later.  12C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.

## Planning Outlook

### All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 1 July, 2026

A changeable westerly Atlantic pattern this week and into the weekend. By later Wednesday into Thursday, a spell of upland gales and more widespread rain. Risk of another windy and wetter spell into Friday. Rain and cloud most frequent over western hills from Lake District northward. Temperatures this week near or slightly below average, with marked wind chill on tops. An improving trend from the south over the weekend, best conditions for Wales and eastern hills elsewhere. Drier and warmer conditions more likely into next week, though southwesterlies may still bring more cloud to the west, some rain mainly northwest Scotland.
