

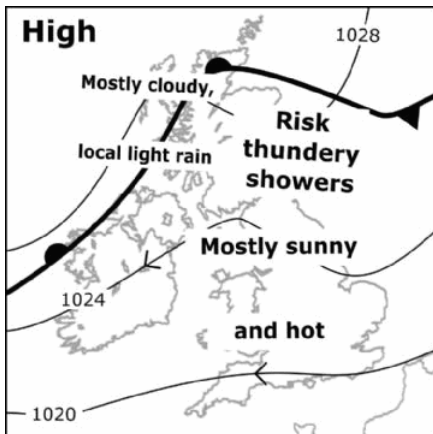

General Summary for Saturday, 11 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 July, 2026

Fairly cloudy Scottish highlands, drizzly tops east where a risk of thundery showers; drier west, local bright breaks. A rising risk of heavy/thundery showers forming over Southern Uplands. Very warm and sunny in England, but high cloud and a risk of showers far north later. Extensive hot sunshine for Wales.

Very warm, mostly sunny; breezy later with risk of showers north

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 11 July, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the summits)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Easterly 10-15mph, sometimes lower speeds too. Trending towards higher speeds through afternoon, sustained 20mph over tops in the evening with gusts approaching 30mph+ over tops into night.</p> <p>Small most of the day, quickly becoming quite breezy late in the day into night.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Rising risk heavy showers north</p> <p>The morning is probably dry, then a rising risk of pop-up showers forming over N Pennines. With time, these could cluster and become locally heavy and linger into evening. Yorks Dales likely stays dry.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Morning fog eastern North Pennines</p> <p>At dawn, sea fog shrouds eastern N Pennines, cloud unlikely reaching all the way to Cross Fell group (and cloud tops below summits if so). Fog begins lifting and dissipating back towards the coast for clear fells. Cloud unlikely over Yorks Dales NP.</p> <p>Starting 50% N Pennines, rising to above 90% widely</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Low slopes of eastern N Pennines start overcast, this clearing for a patchwork of cloud and sun; more extensive sunshine Yorks Dales NP. Very good visibility.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 700m)</p> <p>And in the valleys</p>	<p>14C rising to 17C near and east of Cross Fell group, to 20C Yorks Dales.</p> <p>14C at dawn, a degree warmer Vale of Eden and south of Teesdale. Rising to 22C north of Teesdale, to 25C southern Yorks Dales.</p>

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 12 July	Monday 13 July
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 15-20mph. Strongest early, when notable gusts over tops and downslope approach 30-35mph south. Fairly small, but quite gusty early when buffeting affects stability not just on high terrain.	Easterly 10-20mph, strongest in the south. Notable gusts over tops, pushing downslope in the early hours. Fairly small, some nuisance gusts over tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Likely dry Small chance of a few spots of rain here and there in the morning, but the fells more likely entirely dry.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive early, clearing A layer of fog shrouds many east fells from 500-600m up in the morning; high western tops in cloud, but adjacent western valleys perhaps with little cloud. Fog lifts and breaks for clear fells, slower to clear east N Pennines. 20% rising to 90%	Soon breaking off most or all fells At dawn, sea fog drifts across eastern N Pennines fairly widely; less reaching western high tops, which may be above cloud layer. Yorks Dales may see only patchy banks to the east. Cloud soon begins to lift and burn back for clear fells. 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and foggy at dawn, cloud gradually breaking for afternoon sun with good visibility.	Sun increasingly extensive as early low cloud breaks; may stay patchier eastern N Pennines for a time. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	12C rising to 15 or 16C, warmest Yorks Dales. 12 to 13C at dawn, coolest east N Pennines; rising to 19C eastern N Pennines, to 22C western dales.	9C at dawn rising to 16C. 9 or 10C at dawn, rising to 19 to 22C; coolest eastern N Pennines, warmest south of Tebay.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 12 July, 2026

Staying very warm late weekend into next week. High pressure north of the country keeps the skies mostly clear and facilitates an easterly flow, pushing the warmest temperatures to western hill groups. Northeastern areas will see early sea fog under the high pressure, this dissipating in the sun through morning. Scottish highlands seeing temperatures often rise into the mid-teens, valley temperatures to the 20s west; warmest Wales where hill temperatures often to 20C or higher. A fairly sustained breeze most of the week in England and Wales, at times stronger and quite gusty. Low pressure south of the country may push cloud and showers into Wales, though confidence remains low, and could remain largely dry. Detail uncertain later next week, but a milder northerly flow may begin to establish.
