

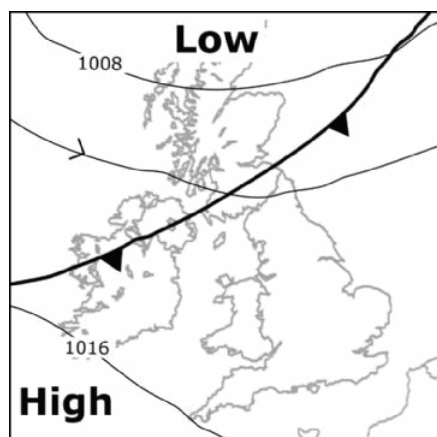

General Summary for Sunday, 9 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 August, 2026

A cold front, bringing rain and low cloud will progress only slowly southeast into central Britain. To the north, drizzly showers and low cloud will affect western mountains (mainly NW Highlands) whilst to the south mostly sunny and very warm.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Windy; rain, mainly toward north and persistent low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 9 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 30 to at times 40mph on higher tops and some higher passes and cols. Ease markedly from north into northern Pennines only late in day.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous-to-arduous conditions; buffeting gusts and notable wind chill. Later conditions may ease markedly most likely only N Pennines.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle on and off N Pennines: Some dry periods but rain from time to time. Western Yorkshire dales north of Forest of Bowland: Total rain small, but rain and drizzle now and again. Elsewhere: Extensively dry, just the odd burst of rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive Widespread fog from 200-300m up western Yorkshire dales north of Ingleton whilst further south low cloud may only form afternoon onwards. Higher cloud base N Pennines where most cloud above 500 or 600m. Eastern dales in Yorkshire often free of fog, although patches slowly forming later in
Chance of cloud free summits?	Varied across region; 20% but 80% southern and western Yorkshire dales
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and often dull with poor visibility, although particularly morning patches of sunshine and very good visibility southern and eastern Yorkshire dales.
How Cold? (at 700m)	11 to 13C, warmest Yorks Dales, later trending towards the cooler end of the range.
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 16C, but 19 to 21C southern Yorkshire dales.

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 15-20mph, dropping to very low speeds by afternoon.	Southerly 10 or 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Becoming negligible	Mostly negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Clearing during morning By mid morning, cloud rare below 900m; then very likely clearing.	Very unlikely
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sun - perhaps through areas of high level cloud. Excellent or increasingly superb visibility.	More or less unbroken sunshine. Excellent or superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 700m)	8C, rising to 14C.	10C rising to 20C
And in the valleys	Will reach 18 to 20C by mid or late afternoon.	Rising to 25 to perhaps locally 28C by mid or late afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 10 August, 2026**

Extensively fine and warm until Wednesday.

The almost completely dry and warm weather will then persist across England and Wales - although sometimes a little rain and low cloud toward Cumbria. Underfoot conditions will remain exceptionally dry.

Scotland, especially the W& NW Highlands, will have intermittent rain and low cloud - although probably still one or two fairly brief dry periods.
