

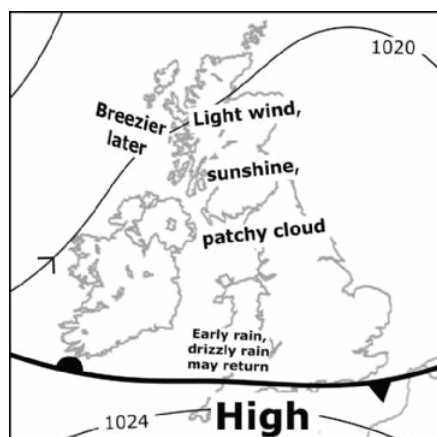
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

The entire Yorkshire Dales National Park and North Pennines AONB, including the Three Peaks and Cross Fell, plus Howgills, also south to Forest of Bowland.



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General Summary for Sunday, 13 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 13 September, 2026

A fine day for most places with light winds. Varied cloud around some hill slopes early in the day tending to lift and break, sunny spells. Risk of more cloud lingering over hills in Wales, some rain and drizzle in the south as a front stays nearby. Southwesterly breezes increase later western Scotland.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Early misty cloud clearing, wind drops light, some sun.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 13 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West-northwesterly 20mph at dawn, easing during morning, to 10mph by middle of day, later southwesterly. Rising from dusk to 25mph into night. Feeling chilly in a fresh breeze early morning, becoming small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Generally dry Small chance a brief drizzly shower, mainly western Yorks Dales southward early in day.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Local patches lifting and clearing Patchy cloud mostly western slopes in Yorks Dales NP in the morning, local mist valleys and lower slopes at first, soon lifting to higher areas and tending to thin and break to leave most cloud above tops by late morning onward. 70% rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable sunshine and cloud, best in east. Visibility excellent, some early mist on hills and lower slopes.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	8C rising to 12C during day, then little change or slight further rise into night. Feeling like 2C in early wind. 11C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.

Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph, speed tending to rise, risk later 50mph; notable strong gusts especially eastern Increasing buffeting over hills, very gusty in places affecting stability, not just highest terrain. Marked chill factor despite mild air.	Westerly 25 to 30mph, possibly 35-40mph briefly from dawn, mainly North Pennines. Blustery across the fells, affecting comfortable walking with some buffeting in exposure and marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain west, risk wetter later Light rain or drizzle, most frequent western Yorks Dales up to Tebay, but patchier north and eastward, locally more often dry. Later in daytime, steadier rain moving in from the southwest, risk heavier western areas.	Intermittent rain Showery rain most common toward the west in the morning, but a scattering of showers passing eastward during the day, briefly heavy mainly afternoon.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive, lowest west Dales Blanket cloud across the fells, to mid or some lower slopes in western areas south from Tebay. Cloud base higher north and east of Kirkby Stephen, some breaks to 600-700m best near Teesdale. 20%	Sometimes on high tops Cloud banks clipping higher slopes mostly above 700m, tending to lift higher with time to often clear many summits. 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Rare glimpses of sun mainly morning in eastern areas, where visibility good below cloud. Mistier further southwest.	Occasional sun mostly eastern dales. Visibility often very good, briefly reduced in showers.
How Cold? (at 700m) And in the valleys	13C, humid, little change all day, then starting to lower slightly into night. Feeling like 0 to 3C directly in the wind. 12C from dawn, rising to 20C afternoon, staying very mild into evening.	8 or 9C, small change then trending slightly cooler later in daytime. Feeling near to 0C in the wind. 12C at dawn, around 16C afternoon, cooling into the evening.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 14 September, 2026

Staying unsettled during the next week to 10 days as westerlies prevail - areas of low pressure passing north of Scotland with frontal systems bringing frequent rain, wettest over western mountains in Scotland. Often windy, gale-force westerly winds for periods over higher terrain. Fairly warm and humid on Monday, then on the cooler side for several days, with considerable wind chill on the mountains. Higher pressure and better weather tends to expand further north later in month.
