

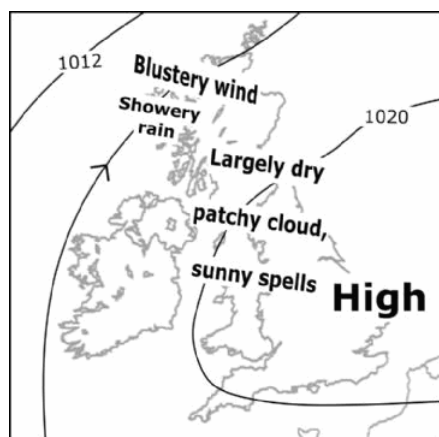
Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

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General Summary for Monday, 28 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 September, 2026

Breezy over Scottish mountains, windier further northwest, feeling chilly. Showery for western Lochaber, Mull and around Skye, tending to fade during afternoon. Largely dry elsewhere, varied cloud over hills in morning, lifting and breaking above many tops with some sunshine. Lighter winds for England & Wales.

Headline for Yorkshire Dales & North Pennines

Moderate breeze eases. Sunshine and broken cloud, hills clear.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 28 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 10 to 20mph, strongest in the morning toward the north. Into late evening and night, strengthening southeasterly to gusty 25-30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small during daylight.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Any early brief light spots on hills toward western Dales soon fading.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Brief patchy cloud around some slopes mainly western areas early morning, plus local mist in some valleys around dawn. All lifting and dispersing for clear hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80% rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 700m)	6C rising to 10C.
And in the valleys	3 or 4C from dawn, chance a local pocket of frost in sheltered valleys. Rising to max 17C afternoon.

	Tuesday 29 September	Wednesday 30 September
How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 35 to 50mph, with turbulent gusts downslope toward west, and risk rising to 60mph over higher tops.	Southerly 25 to 40mph, at times 50mph at least in gusts on higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging walking conditions on exposed terrain, but sudden buffeting also to some lower elevations.	Strenuous walking conditions, frequent buffeting in exposure on high terrain, gusts knocking you off balance.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain at times Spots of rain from time to time, drizzly where in cloud, may develop into pulses of steadier rain spreading from the south, but more likely small amounts.	Heavy rain for a time A band of heavy rain moves northeastward across the region likely during the morning, then drier for a time, later a risk of showery bursts of rain returning.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud may cover most hills Risk of fairly extensive cloud across the hills, most persistent south and eastern areas, but clinging around most tops. Some breaks mainly toward Vale of Eden. May thin a little into the afternoon.	Lifting and breaking Extensive cloud over the hills in early rain, then lifting rapidly and clearing toward upper slopes, most tops clearing, odd patches occasionally.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy. Hazy, risk murkier south and east.	Intermittent sun breaking through. Poor visibility in rain, then improving to be very good.
How Cold? (at 700m)	9C rising to 14C; then little change onward into night.	Humid 13C or above from dawn, dropping during the day to a fresher 10C later. Feeling near/below freezing in the wind.
And in the valleys	10C at dawn, rising to humid 20C afternoon, then staying very mild onward into the night.	Very mild and humid 16C or above from dawn, up to max 20C, then dropping cooler into evening.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 29 September, 2026

Strong southeasterly winds by Tuesday, widely gales on mountains with turbulent downslope gusts toward the west; some rain developing from the south during the day, becoming heavy later - a band of rain moves northeast into early Wednesday, leaving blustery south-southwesterlies into Wednesday and Thursday, showery in the west. Some occasional rain further ahead, but more often looking drier as higher pressure tends to expand further north during early October. Mostly mild temperatures, some cooler nights develop.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Sunday, 27 September, 2026
